A Message from Hilary +

Dear Friends and Companions in Ministry,

We entered Advent on Sunday, November 27, and will be here until Christmas. There was a time in the Episcopal Church when Advent was considered a penitential season like



Lent, the idea being that we prepare ourselves spiritually for the celebration of both Easter and Christmas in a focused way. For a long time, spiritual preparation was

dominated by identifying and naming one's sins, and then repenting. Even in Lent we now open ourselves to a number of ways of preparing, not just repentance. Regardless of how one views Lent, these days before Christmas are not a "little Lent." Advent is a distinctive season of



the Church year, and one that I find to be rich in imagery and energy. As baby Jesus grew in Mary before birth, Christ can grow in us and be born anew at Christmas, for us, our families, and our communities.

Our faith can grow being shaped by the traditional Advent themes of watching and waiting, preparing and expecting. We are

expectant as we await Christmas, both our annual celebration of the birth of Jesus and our personal family traditions that go with this season. Maybe we will do something new this year; maybe God will do something new with us. Once again, at our church, we are using resources from Sanctified Art, which include poems, images, artists' descriptions, and words for worship. I hope that you enjoy and find conversation partners in these resources. You will hear and pray some of the words for worship during our services.

The overall theme from Sanctified Art for Advent 2022 is "Generation to Generation," taken from Mary's song, the Magnificat: "My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord, my spirit rejoices in God my Savior; for he has looked with favor on his lowly servant. From this day all generations will call me blessed: the Almighty has done great things for me, and holy is his Name...." Many generations later, we carry on the traditions of our faith; from generation to generation, we have remembered Mary, a willing servant of God, who gave the world Jesus. From generation to generation we have celebrated the birth of our Savior and told the stories about that star-lit night when everything changed.

May your Christmas celebration be filled with a sense of God's love for you.

Queridos amigos y compañeros de ministerio,

Entramos en Adviento el domingo 27 de noviembre y estaremos aquí hasta Navidad. Hubo un tiempo en la Iglesia Episcopal en que el Adviento se consideraba una temporada



penitencial como la Cuaresma, la idea es que nos preparemos espiritualmente para la celebración tanto de Pascua como de Navidad de manera enfocada. Durante mucho tiempo, la preparación espiritual estuvo dominada por identificar y nombrar los pecados y

luego arrepentirse. Incluso en Cuaresma ahora nos abrimos a una serie de formas de preparación, no solo al arrepentimiento. Independientemente de cómo se vea la Cuaresma, estos días antes de Navidad no son una "pequeña Cuaresma". R-1a Achieving Net Carbon Neutrality by 2030 - The resolution commits our Diocesan offices and operations to reach this goal by 2030 and urges congregations, our church schools, and retirement homes to also commit to reaching Net Zero carbon emissions from their operations by 2030.

R2a Uniform Family Leave - This resolution calls on the federal government and the Commonwealth of Virginia to institute mechanisms to fund and administer a uniform paid family leave policy to care for newborns, to promote bonding between newborns and parents or adoptees and parents, and to allow for the care of immediate family members during illness.

R-3s Promotes Solidarity with Global Efforts
to Expand COVID Vaccines and Treatment
particularly in low- and middle-income countries.

R4 History of Episcopal Succession - This resolution provides that all histories produced by our Diocese recognize and include Bishop Suffragan and Ecclesiastical Authority Susan

E. Goff in the succession of diocesan Episcopal leadership between Bishop Shannon S. Johnston and Bishop-Elect E. Mark Stevenson.

<u>R-5a Promotion of Civil Discourse</u> - The resolution calls on elected officials, candidates for all offices, and Episcopalians, in particular,

to publicly repudiate hate speech and to engage in civil discourse. It also encourages Episcopalians and parishes to make use of the Civil Discourse Curriculum developed by The Episcopal Church Office of Government Relations.

R-6 The Creation of Assistant Bishop
Positions to support our new Bishop. In anticipation of the retirement of Bishop
Susan Goff, December 31, 2022, and



with the recent departure of Bishop Jennifer Brooke-Davidson, the resolution authorizes the appointment of up to two Assistant Bishops by Bishop-Elect E. Mark Stevenson following his consecration.

Budget

The Convention passed a budget balanced at \$5,661,700. Featured in the 2023 budget are increased parish pledges of approximately \$240,000 reflecting support of the 2021 R1a Covenantal Giving Plan. Also resulting from that resolution are the cost of waiving program fees for Annual Convention and Clergy Conferences.

Program highlights are a 25% increase in funding of prison ministry through GraceInside, consulting and other resources for congregations in transition and congregational development, and the full funding of campus ministries. Staffing measures fund three full-time bishops, a Canon for Christian Formation, and a Director of Shrine Mont Camps.

Holy Comforter's delegate, Terry Long, commented, "... it was the most peaceful convention I have attended in the 12 or 13 years I have been an alternate or lay delegate. Now, it's on to the consecration on December 3rd."

Remember The Main Ingredient's song:

"Everybody plays the fool, sometime There's no exception to the rule Listen baby, it may be factual, may be cruel I want to tell ya that Everybody plays the fool - "

Have you ever played a fool for a cause, a friend, a love, a child, or because of Jesus Christ? It seems that most of the time, we do not want to be anybody's fool and yet we have been

somebody's fool often.
This is either because we fall into it or because we deliberately get into it, usually for love of someone or something.



In this month's movie, *Nobody's Fool*, Donald "Sully" Sullivan has several problems - his estranged and unemployed son shows up with his son, his flirtatious married girlfriend is becoming serious about him, he is still feuding with her husband Carl with no good results, he is nearly bankrupt, and has diminishing prospects for more business or better days.

But he does have friends: Toby, his sort of girlfriend; his landlady Beryl; "Rub" Squeers, his best friend; "Wirf" Wizfly, his one-legged lawyer; Jocko at the bar; and Ollie, the town's Police Chief. North Bath, New York, Sully's hometown, is a place I know well. It's a small town like hundreds of others I've been in, growing up in New York State. In fact, it closely resembles Watertown, where my Grandmother was born. Nothing much happens there, never did, never will.

All of this seems pretty much not interesting or remarkable. North Bath is a fictional stand-in for all of the small towns in North America that have no compelling narrative about them, but are where 61% of the population lives (in cities with fewer than 50,000 residents). This is like the town I was brought home to as a newborn. Had I stayed there my whole life, I would be like one of Sully's friends or like Sully. I certainly identify with him. Richard Russo, who wrote the book this movie is based on, captivated me in several books he authored. And he certainly did it in his story of Sully and his friends in North Bath. I recommend reading his books.

And Sully, a Checkov character in a Checkovian story, hasn't achieved much so far and probably won't. So why is he, North Bath or


> his story interesting enough for us? Well, it's actually funny, fascinating and fulfilling to see this aging yet immature person grow in wisdom and finally realize himself into a contented, grown-up with the blended family of his new dog, son and grandson, and lifelong friends, who love him just as

he is with all of his flaws.




This may be one of Paul Newman's signature roles. Some critics and commentators think he is at his best as Sully. They use adjectives like: charming, authentic, graceful, poetic, spirited, and dramatic. The drama is what we come for, and we get it in this story of a man who finally, in the last third of his life, grows up and becomes the beautiful, loving person that God meant him to be. The audiences and critics loved this movie.

Rotten Tomatoes said it was 91% fresh; IMDb gave it a 7.3/10 score and said it was a delightful experience to be in the town of North Bath and meet all of these very real characters. It was nominated for 10 awards and won 5, three of them for Paul Newman as Best Actor in a Leading Role. Bruce Willis signed on for minimum actor's scale in order to be in this movie.



Don "Sully" Sullivan has avoided any serious duties that life requires of us. He lives according to the "Nobody's Fool" Doctrine that states that one is not to be too close or too committed or too responsible to be taken in by anyone. Singularly detached and yet blind to the opportunity of plunging into a relationship with some person and even foolishly surrendering to loving, Sully is, at the end, awake, aware and awash in a soulsatisfying way. Couldn't ask for more!

So let's go visit North Bath for an evening! We will gather in the Parlor at 6:00pm for fellowship on Tuesday, December 13th; the film will begin to roll at 6:30pm, discussion to follow. It is a great way to move toward the Christmas season and end the year! Join us! Contact me with any questions.
